With roughly 35,000 students living at or below poverty level, the Foundation has always been a critical resource. The simple fact is that when schools close, student hunger goes up.

But with your help, the Foundation was able to adapt to the sudden increase in need. We provided an average of 4,278 meals per day to families who did not have alternative resources.

I believe that the resources available to our students through Granite Education Foundation improve a student's ability to do better academically. It is sometimes the littlest thing that can make it easier for a student to stop worrying and start learning. Students shouldn't have to worry about: sweaty feet because they cannot afford socks, icy cold fingers because they have no gloves at recess, no brush at home to brush their hair before school and kids making fun of them, having lice (possibly for the 5th or 6th time) with no way to treat it, coming to school hungry, or leaving school wishing they had a snack to hold them over until school breakfast tomorrow.

I can probably think of over a hundred scenarios where I have seen needs and turned to the Foundation for a way to alleviate the worry.

Sometimes I am the only advocate for our students because I am the only one who knows about the problem, or knows where to get help for our families. I have asked GEF many times for help for our students. Without the resources and goods provided by GEF, I could not help students stop worrying and start learning.

It is clear to me that GEF, through their programs that provide new clothing, shoes, school supplies, backpacks, or hygiene kits, and everything else, literally helps meet our students' most basic needs so they can focus on being a kid and being in school.

I know first-hand that Granite Education Foundation programs help students improve educational attainment. I have met with countless families who needed assistance. GEF's programs & partners make food available, as well as provide relief during a family crisis. Delivering relief to parents translates into children who feel more secure and better able to concentrate in school. This, of course, leads to better scores and overall learning and achievement.

I have had parents cry in my office after I reached out to GEF to get assistance for food, clothing or Christmas/Holidays. I can't begin to tell you how many parents were both shocked and overwhelmed with gratitude when they realize the comprehensive help that is made available during a family difficulty.

I have literally had mothers come to me with nothing, after having just left an abusive relationship. Almost immediately, the fear and uncertainty give way to relief and courage, because of the access GEF provides to clothing and food, all of which helps these mothers get back on their feet.

It has been my experience that parents only come asking for help when in the deepest need, as it can be humiliating for them. We help them understand that most families will experience some type of crisis and, while GEF programs are short-term interventions, they are offered free of judgment and help provide assistance at the very moment they are needed.

The bottom line is this: when parents have what they need for their children, they can focus on higher functions, such as their child's academics, which is a win-win for everyone.

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COVID-19:

MEETING NEW CHALLENGES

On Friday March 13th, Granite School District announced that schools would be closed, starting Monday March 16th, due to the coronavirus. This closure brought new challenges to Granite Education Foundation; we needed to figure out how to get food to our pantries and students and families, while dealing with COVID-19.

Before the pandemic, we delivered food on pallets to our in–school food pantries and the pantry coordinators would sort and distribute the food, with students and families shopping the pantries during open hours. COVID-19 prevented people from shopping the pantries, so we needed an easy and quick way to get food to those in need in Granite School District. We came up with food bags; a preassembled bag of food that the schools could easily hand out to students and families.

Using space at the Donation & Distribution Center and food we already had in stock, we recruited volunteers to help bag up food to be delivered to schools with existing in–school food pantries. Every week, pantry coordinators/principals requested deliveries of food bags that were prepared by volunteers, and then delivered by volunteer drivers to the schools.

During the 10 weeks schools were closed, Granite Education Foundation distributed 213,900 meals, an average of 4,278 meals per day. The value of the meals distributed was approximately \$300,000. Utah Food Bank and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter–Day Saints Bishop's Storehouse provided additional food, which enabled us to have adequate supplies of food during the closure.

UTAH FOOD BANK:

HELPING US MEET HUNGER

Utah Food Bank is a key partner in helping Granite Education Foundation provide food to our students and families. Every month they provide food that we are able to distribute out to schools. They have also made arrangements with our larger in–school pantries to deliver directly to these schools. They provide a wide variety of non-perishable food, along with frozen and refrigerator items.

In addition to providing food for our in–school food pantries, Utah Food Bank also runs Mobile Food Pantries in about 30 of our schools. Each month they arrive at the school, bag up the food, and hand it out to students and families. During the 10 weeks schools were closed last spring due to COVID-19, the Foundation worked with Utah Food Bank to ensure the Mobile Food Pantries would still run. Each week the Utah Food Bank delivered food to our Donation & Distribution Center. Volunteers then bagged and delivered the food to schools; who would then disperse the food with Grab-and-go lunches.

Granite Education Foundation is so grateful to Utah Food Bank. They are a wonderful partner that helps us to meet the basic needs of our students and families. Thank you!




